


















Key elements of selected communities

- Multi-sectoral collaboration (communities, schools, worksites, health care)
- A focus on racial and ethnic health disparities
- Leveraging the assets and strengths of communities and our own organization
- Long-term partnerships (7-10 years)
- · Evaluation and evidence-based public health





Thriving Communities: Denver Metro Area, 2005









Tri-County Health Department

- 1.1 million residents over 25% of Colorado population
- 3 counties: Adams Arapahoe, and Douglas
- · All or part of 24 cities and towns
- TCHD has five Divisions all participating in Thriving Communities

Historic Commerce City

- 8 square miles
- Population: approximately 19,000
- Racially and ethnically diverse - 53% Hispanic, many monolingual Spanish
- 9 neighborhoods
- Many residents have lived in the City for several decades, but 1/3 of population is under 20 years old
- In 2000, 15% of families lived in poverty

Derby/Hanson History and Status

- Thriving core of historic Commerce City
 - Derby commercial
 - Hanson residential
- Declining commercial character over the years
- Growth and redevelopment elsewhere
 in the City have largely bypassed Derby
- Recent beginnings of a turnaround

Redevelopment Opportunities Through Transportation Planning

- 72nd Avenue Derby's Southern boundary
 - Links west part of City and Prairie Gateway
- HW2 Derby's Western boundary
 - Planning to preserve future Right-of-Way
 - Links projects SW and NE
- North Metro EIS City to participate
 - Involves light rail station

Thriving Community Benefits to City Planning Process

- Opportunity to work with TCHD, businesses, grassroots groups outside the normal bureaucracy
- Staff collaboration to develop the grant is informing key redevelopment decisions
- Opened doors to future neighborhood
 plans that were not on the table

- History of collaboration between City and TCHD
 - Ongoing involvement in new and redevelopment activities

 - Concurrent start of Derby Study and Thriving Communities Project
 - Inclusive philosophy of City staff and consultant

- Stakeholders Group and Steering Committee
- Strong partnerships:
 - City: Manager's Office, Parks and Rec, Planning, Police, Planning, Economic Development
 - Community: Non-profits, Community residents, local businesses, School District, Churches

- Was your walk pleasant?

- Where can you walk to in your neighborhood?
- How frequently do you walk to these places?
- Are there places in you area you would like to walk to but can't?
- What are they and why?
















Optimism for Derby Runs High





 Sidewalk Repair 	15.4%

 Widen Sidewalks 	5.3%
