# What is Land Use Planning?

Stakeholder process by which cities and counties determine what gets built and where.




# What is the authority for planning?

- Local government has police power to protect the public health, safety, and welfare of its residents.
- Land use regulations must be reasonably related to the **public** welfare.

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# What Directs Planning?

A General Plan (or Comprehensive Plan) is a City's official policy statement regarding its future character, land use patterns, and quality of development.



# Tools for Implementing a General Plan/Comprehensive Plan

- ❖ Specific Plans
- The Zoning Ordinance
- Subdivision Ordinance
- California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)
- City Council Policies
- Design Guidelines



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## What are Specific Plans?

- Specific Plans are detailed plans for specific areas of the City.
  - Proactive approach to shaping development
  - Prevents piecemeal development by linking GP policies and individual development proposals in defined area
  - ✓ Provides more detail for implementation than the General Plan

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# What is Zoning?

- Legislative decision by Council, which:
  - ✓ Divides the City into districts,
  - Prescribes what can and cannot be built on each parcel,
  - ✓ Regulates the use, placement, spacing, and size of land and buildings



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## What is Subdivision?

- Division of land into 2 or more parcels
- State legislation varies, but the intent remains to:
  - Ensure orderly development
  - Properly improved with public facilities
  - Protect from fraud

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## **Entitlement Sequence**


- "Discretionary" (i.e., with public hearing):
  - ✓ General Plan Amendment (may include Specific Plan Amendment)
  - ✓ Zoning
  - ✓ Development Permit (Site Permit, Conditional Use Permit, Special Use Permit or Planned Development Permit)
  - ✓ Tentative Map

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# Entitlement Sequence (cont.)

- "Ministerial" (i.e., no public hearing):
  - ✓ Public Works Clearance
  - ✓ Building Permits

- Project files are available to Public
- The contents include:
  - ✓ Plans
  - ✓ Memoranda and correspondence
  - ✓ Environmental analyses (e.g., traffic, biology, etc.)
  - ✓ Staff reports and/or Permits
  - √ Conditions of approval

# Influence a New Development

- Find a development application
- ❖Talk to the staff reviewing the proposal ✓Determine where it is in the process
- Determine the most effective strategy
  - ✓ Opportunity to mix uses, add parks?
  - ✓ Pedestrian connections, bike paths, etc.
  - ✓Street standards: sidewalks, bus stops, etc.

## Influence a New Development

- ❖ Work with staff to suggest your ideas
- ❖ Write letters, copying your elected officials
- Attend community meetings, bring likeminded people and speak up
- Meet with the Planning Director, land owner &/or developer
- Lobby your elected officials
- Testify at the public hearing

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## Get Involved in Policy Creation

- ❖Find a champion (elected official)
- Request modification to existing codes/policies
- Or, request creation of new code/policy
- ❖Work with staff team
- ❖Keep in touch with your champion
- Bring your colleagues to the hearing

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## Improve Internal Standards

- Improve street standards:
  - ✓ Reduce widths
  - ✓ Add crosswalks
  - ✓ Add medians, etc.
- Fix sidewalk standards:
  - ✓ Increase widths
  - ✓ Add trees, etc.
- ❖ Require transit amenities:
  - ✓ Shelters, benches, etc.
